Presidents' United to Solve Hunger

Summary

The Presidents' United to Solve Hunger (PUSH) program was developed by the Hunger Solutions Institute at Auburn University (of Alabama) and is cosponsored by the UN Food and Agriculture Organization and the Association of Public and Land-grants Universities.

The UN's Secretary General has issued the Zero Hunger Challenge, where every man, woman, and child on earth has access to sufficient nutritious food. The Alliance to End Hunger engages diverse institutions (corporations, non-profit groups, universities, associations, individuals) to build public and political will to end hunger at home and abroad.

Individual universities have made significant contributions to food security, but never before have joined in collective action to share best practices in teaching, research, outreach, and student engagement to address food and nutrition security for everyone, everywhere.

Recommendations for Moving Forward - What it means for #WesternU

- Establish official Western Ad Hoc committee on Hunger with representatives from Faculty, Staff, Affiliate and USC – to meet 3-4 times per year and lead initiatives
- Develop an action plan for a Zero Hunger Campus
- Look at possibility of greater emphasis on university research on ending hunger
- Look for continued opportunities for collaboration between student affairs and academic programs to address local and global human sustainability
- Develop new opportunities to cooperate with other universities in North America and in developing nations
- Look at possibility of developing more CEL courses focusing on hunger related topics (Currently only one course that specifically focuses on the topic) – and developing more main-campus opportunities
- Increase accessibility and communication of hunger-related information/initiatives to campus and global community
- Develop more awareness initiatives within the student community focus on global issues (many student initiatives focus on local community/student community)
- Develop more advocacy programs to increase awareness of global hunger issues
